HOAFF'S OWN MIKE GEORGE RECEIVES THE BUZ BUSZEK AWARD

The International Federation of Fly Fishers' Buz Buszek Fly Tying Award is the most prestigious award in the world of fly tying. The award was established as a memorial to Buz Buszek, a well-known fly tier and flyshop owner since 1943. His flyshop, simply called the Buz Buszek Fly Shop, was located at 400 North Johnson Street, Visalia, California. Mickey Powell, his son-in-law, who took over the shop, has written a fascinating personal view of the history of the Buz Buszek Fly Shop. Buz was a world-class angler, an excellent fly tyer and a dedicated teacher. He had a number of patterns to his name and his fly shop specialized in fly tying materials. Buz died suddenly in 1965. A Fresno club established an award in his name. Later, led in part by his wife, Virginia Buszek Perry, the Buz Buszek Memorial Award was established at the international level of the Federation. The award came with a one-inch gold feather recognition pin.

HOAFF's own Mike George is this year's recipient. Mike is considered to be at the pinnacle of those fly tiers who stack and trim deer hair.

One of the judging criteria is creativity or innovation: Every one of Mike's flies is his own design, some of which he's devoted years to perfect, pioneering numerous new tying techniques in the process.

Another Criteria for this Award is fly tying skills. Mike's achievements are significant:

- Mike was the first and second place winner in the Federations 2006 fly tying competition
- Mike has been named Southern Council Fly Tier of the year twice
- Mike has received eight Gold and two Silver Medals over the last 11 years in the MUSTAD Open Category International contest: no other tier has achieved this in the history of the competition.
- Mike entered a single pattern in the Mustad Dry Fly Category at the same competition and won a gold medal for that fly also.



Mike's generosity in sharing is without limits! He demonstrates at numerous shows as far away as Norway. Mike teaches many classes and workshops. He teaches regularly at K&K Fly Shop, Boy Scouts of America and Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing.

Mike is a veteran of the Vietnam war and his Patriotic Flies in memory of the F-105 pilots, whose aircraft he loaded with ordnance have raised money for many good causes, bringing at times over \$500 apiece at auction. A short list of causes his donated flies have supported are the IFFF Clubs & Councils (HOAFF each year), Project Healing Waters, Reel Recovery, Trout Unlimited, Casting for Recovery, Good Samaritan Boys Ranch, and the Jose Wejbe Foundation.

Recently Mike produced his first instructional video "Deer Hair Sculptures" and has a second in development.

Needless to say, it is evident that Mike is eminently qualified for the Buz Buszek Award! It's something Mike always wanted but did not expect – congratulations Mike and we are very proud to have you as a member of HOAFF!

STEVE HEGSTROM WINS BRONZE AWARD

Steve Hegstrom was bestowed the Bronze Award by the International Federation of Fly Fishers. Al and Gretchen Beatty, who are well known in the fly tying world, commented on Steve's flies: "We just finished evaluating your selection of flies for the Bronze Award a few minutes ago. Wow! Your overall score was 93.5% for the Bronze flies and 100% for the Tier's Choice. Your flies were some of the best we've had the pleasure of evaluating. Good job!" Frank Johnson of Sheridan, Wyoming, who is an IFFF Fly Tying Group Committee member oversees the evaluators and also evaluated Steve's flies stating, "Steve, I received your flies from Al and Gretchen today. I've taken a look at them and the evaluation and can only say 'good job' to all. Your flies are among the best I've seen. Congratulations, I'm forwarding them to the IFFF office tomorrow with the approval for your Bronze Award." In closing Al Beatty stated in a letter, "Steve, your name will be on the IFFF website for the whole world to see that you have joined Gretchen and me (and a bunch of other people) on the Bronze Award list. It's kind of cool for the whole world to know your flies have been evaluated to be among the best of the best. Yes, many people tie great looking flies every day but not everyone compares them to a known bench mark like you have. Good Job!" Steve received a plaque and the Bronze Pin from the IFFF for his accomplishment.



NEVERSINK SKATER

An article in the most recent issue of Fly Fusion Magazine caught my attention, recommending taking a look at some classic flies called "Skaters" again. Skaters were popularized by Edward Ringwood Hewitt started fishing skaters on the Neversink River in the Catskills in the 1920s after watching large trout taking butterflies. His famous pattern is called the Neversink Skater. The article "rang my bell" because I recently watched a large spider fall into the water at Bennett Spring and drift downstream about 25 feet when no fish were visibly rising and a trout took it so aggressively that it came fully out of the water jumping a full two feet in the air! Hewitt recommended the skater as especially effective when no fish are rising and few bugs on the water; sounds like Bennett Spring to me!

The Neversink Skater is tied on a Dry Fly Hook, sizes 16-8, 1X or 2X short shank. There is no body or tail, just two to four oversize high-quality dry-fly hackles. Spade hackles were preferred, but they can be hard to find today so large, stiff saddle hackles are more commonly used. It's good to have a variety of colors from dark to light: brown to black hackle, brown to grizzly and light cream to light dun are recommended.

The key to a successful Neversink Skater is to achieve the correct narrow profile and large diameter.

Cover the shank with thread from the eye to the hook bend. Select two to four hackles with two to four times the length of the hook gape! Tie in the first hackle(s) with their shiny sides to the rear of the hook and wrap them to the middle of the shank, this will cause them to curve toward the front of the hook. In much the same way you compact deer hair, use your thumb



and forefinger to push the hackles back on themselves. Tie in another hackle or two toward the eye of the hook with the shiny side toward the eye of the hook which will cause them to curve toward the rear; push this hackle or hackles back toward the one(s) you've already tied in. Their tips should touch, forming the narrow profile you see in the photo.

Recommendations for fishing the Skater call for a long (9-9.5 ft rod) 4-5 weight with a fairly heavy tippet: 3X or 4X because the fly is wind resistant and you'll need a heavier tippet to turn it over properly. Twitch and hop Skaters across the surface; so, it's important to grease the leader with floatant and fish them on as short a line as possible. These are not for dead-drifting! They can drive fish nuts! -especially when nothing else is happening. I'm determined to try these at Bennett Spring and I'd like you to do so also and compare notes!
